What is the I&A Study?

 Section 26-510(b) of the Rent Stabilization Law requires the Rent Guidelines Board to consider "relevant data from the current and projected cost of living indices" and permits consideration of other measures of housing affordability in its deliberations


What is the I&A Study?

- The *I&A Study* reports on housing affordability and tenant income by examining economic factors, rent levels, and public policies
- Factors include:
 - Economic factors such as inflation and job growth
 - Household income and housing costs
 - Eviction proceedings, homelessness, usage of emergency assistance and other indicators

Income & Affordability Overview


- City's economy contracts by "real" 6.3%
- City loses 516,600 jobs, 11.1% decline
- Equal rise in inflation, 1.7%
- Average "real" wages increase 6.0%; "real" total wages decrease 1.8%
- Unemployment rate rises to 12.3%
- Non-payment filings fall 56.4% and calendared cases by 62.7%
- Evictions decrease 82.0%
- Homeless levels fall 5.9%
- Cash assistance recipients increase 8.6%
- SNAP recipients increase 5.2%







Average Wage Data



*In September of 2020, up to six weeks of retroactive payments of \$300 per week (up to \$1,800 total) were provided to qualified beneficiaries through the federal Lost Wages Assistance Program. Retroactive payments were made only to those people unemployed during the six-week period spanning the end of August through the beginning of September of 2020 who certified (or had previously certified) that they lost employment due to COVID-19.




NYC Renter-Occupied Family Households




Median Gross Rent-to-Income Ratios (ACS Survey)




Rent Burdened Households (ACS Survey)




Monthly Rent in Real 2019 Dollars (ACS Survey)




Household Income Changes by Quintile, 2006-2019 (ACS Survey)




Renter Housing Costs as a % of Household Income (ACS Survey)




% of Renter Households with Housing Insecurity



% of Renter Households Experiencing Food Scarcity









COVID-19 Emergency Rental Assistance Program of 2021

- \$2.4 billion in funding for rental assistance
- Guidelines to qualify:
 - Household income at or below 80% of AMI
 - Experiencing unemployment, a reduction in income, significant costs or other financial hardship that are directly or indirectly due to the COVID-19 outbreak
 - Demonstrating a risk of homelessness or housing instability
- Up to 12 months of rent or utility arrears
- Payments made directly to utilities or landlords
 - Acceptance of payment requires landlords to waive late fees on rent arrears; keep rent constant for one year; and no evictions for one year

Income & Affordability Summary

- GCP decreases for first time in 12 years
- Decrease in employment levels
- Rising unemployment rate
- Increase in average real wages, but decrease in total wages
- Increase in cash assistance and SNAP cases
- Decrease in non-payment court filings, calendared cases and evictions
- Decrease in number of homeless in city shelters
- Potentially positive trends many fourth quarter 2020 indicators are positive as compared to the third quarter of 2020

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
